It is a program of helping each woman find, understand, and use her special gifts, and then to reach out to meet the needs of those around her. Hence, the programs will look and function differently in different churches, countries, cultures. Each Women's Ministries program must be shaped to fit the needs of the women it serves. This handbook will give you resources to accomplish this mission and this ministry.

May God richly bless you as you serve Him, as you find your talents and gifts, and as you make a difference for eternity.

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Dear Sisters in Christ:

When a renewal of Women's Ministries was conceived in the 1980's, it was hoped and dreamed that women could make an even greater difference in the Seventh-day Adventist Church--that women would be more involved in the direction and leadership as well as in the mission of the church. As Ellen G White wrote over a century ago:

Christian women are called for. There is a wide field in which they may do good service for the Master. There are noble women who have had moral courage to decide in favor of the truth from the weight of evidence. They have tact, perception, and good ability, and could make successful Christian workers. There is work neglected or done imperfectly that could be thoroughly accomplished through the help that they are able to give. They could reach a class that ministers cannot reach. There are offices in the church that they could fill acceptably, and many branches of the church work that they could attend to if properly instructed. —*Signs of the Times*, Sept 6, 1886.

As we look at the needs around us, we can easily see that the talents and ministries of all our members are necessary—men, women, old and young. We face an amazing array of obstacles and opportunities, and it will take each of us, working together, to meet these needs in the most effective ways. Women can help meet the needs of women in their communities.
